

## Planning our change -Emotional health and well being

Priority - high level impact linked to National Indicators

Priority – The emotional health of children (NI 50) Meaningful Outcome - measurable health and well -being change

## Meaningful Outcome quantitative –

- Increase the number of pupils in Yr 6 (60) who know how to stay safe online
- This will be from a % response of 'yes' to the question 'Do you know how to stay safe online?'

## Meaningful Outcome

- Increase the mean response number on the questionnaire for the question 'How many ways do you know to report online bullying?'
- Increase the confidence of the children in the school with the question On a scale of 1-10 'does your school take bullying seriously?'

## Meaningful Outcome targeted

Pupil with SEN (particularly vulnerable)

 Increase the mean response number on the questionnaire for the question 'How many ways do you know to report online bullying?' Early Success Indicator - one of the milestones on the way to meeting Meaningful Outcomes

- Review and increase the coverage of internet safety lessons within the curriculum
- Children are confident in using the internet safely
- Review the Computing & PSHE policy for Yr 6 with regard to internet/online safety
- Discussion in PSHCE/Computing lessons suggest children are becoming more able to identify different types of internet bullying and how to deal with it
- Pupils have a good knowledge of what CEOPS is and how they can use their website to report internet/on line bullying
- Pupils report that their school takes bullying seriously – discussions/activities to support pupils' increasing confidence in the school taking it seriously
- Childline workshops completed
- Targeted child has more confidence using the internet safely
- Targeted child is beginning to show awareness of how to use CEOPS to report incidents of internet/on line bullying
